
## Bull Terrier Club of Dallas Stand Alone Specialty

## The Best of the Best

*What does it take to be a show dog?*

A show dog should be an excellent ambassador for the breed standard. Dogs compete against other dogs to be chosen as the best representative and should have the temperament and health record to accompany those dashing good looks! The AKC has set up a certain standard that judges study in order to make the best selection – but breeding for that perfection is no easy task! What does it take to get beautiful animals? What does it take to be a good breeder?

## Responsibility Defined

Let's start at the grooming table. One at a time they are placed on a tiny little platform (and as any Bull Terrier owner should know, is a risky idea:) to get all prettied-up. We won't discuss the chalk and powder dusting, nor the "whitening creams" but instead the trimmed toe nails, the shaved whiskers, the schmagma clean up and let's not talk about the bitches in heat! There's a lot that goes into getting a show dog ready for the ring – but what does it take to qualify?

Straight across the back, black glistening eyes looking for trouble, pricked alert ears and the perfect bite. This takes generations of breeding the best of the best dogs to the best of the best bitches. But what about the charming and goofy personality of the Bull Terrier? This also takes experience and time – making all the right matches to get the best combination. This takes knowledge of the bloodlines of the competitors, friends and fellow Bull Terrier fanciers. And of course the health aspect – renal failure, heart disease, obsessive compulsive self mutilation – some of the unfortunate risks when it comes to breeding these beastly bullies.

Once the match of dam and sire has been made – then what? Vitamins, good quality dry or home cooked food, c-sections, whelping, nursing, crate training and the necessary worming and vaccination regimens recommended by veterinarians. And this is what brings them to their people families – a good breeder will know what pup will match what family – the choice is hardly yours. A good breeder will require a contract to be signed to ensure that the puppy not only is fed a well balanced and proper diet, receives the necessary socialization and under any and every circumstance is always welcomed home should some unforeseen event take them from their adopter's life. This is only a part of what it takes to be a good breeder – the heart, compassion and soul that is dedicated to the well being of a breed cannot be measured with words – and for this we thank them!

Traveling all over the country to show off what they've helped create - these are the reasons why the breeding, should be left to the breeders – so let's meet them!

## Bull Terriers

Paul and Miriam Hopkins came to love Bull Terriers in 1998. After a long search to find their first Bull Terrier, Roamin, to join their family in 1999, they decided there could be no other breed for them! After their children moved on and out of their home, they quenched their "empty nest syndrome" and became very active showing their dogs. They developed their kennel, Broken Arrow Bull Terriers, and had their first litter in October of 2005 from Stella. She was a mama of a litter of seven, six of which have become AKC Champions.

Paul & Miriam are Bull Terrier Club of America Members and Miriam has recently become the BTCA Executive Secretary. They have been involved with the Dallas Bull Terrier Club for about 10 years, and Miriam has been BTCD Board member for the last 5 years.

They have assisted in Oklahoma rescue for two years and realize the importance in finding a good breeder and even more importantly: good homes for these clowns in dog suits! "We do our best to expose our pups to children and other animals as early in life as possible. These are our babies and we do all we can to be sure the homes they go to will be forever. The families that get our puppies know they can contact us anytime with any question or concern."

## Glentom Bull Terriers

During Tom's first year in vet school he made the life changing decision to add a Bull Terrier to their family! In 1987 "Ned", Indian Trail



Glentom's Opener, joined Tom and his roommate. Since they had done their research they knew that socialization was important for him, they decided to find a class in which to enter him! There were few obedience classes available in Baton Rouge, LA but what they did find was a confirmation class and joined it following the advice of their mentor, Don Adams. This is where they met Pete Lopez, who actually owned a Bull Terrier himself and encouraged them to finish Ned -which is exactly what they did, and how they got started! After finishing Ned, they got a taste for the show ring and decided they wanted a foundation bitch in order to start their own kennel – and they purchased Piper from Wingate MacKay-Smith of Banbury Bull Terriers and haven't looked back since!

In 1996 they bred a half brother sister pair and produced "Morgan" Ch. Glentom Doublemint O'Berkshire who won Brood Bitch of the Year in 2004 after whelping and BTCA Brood Bitch Emeritus Award by her ROM champion get sired by Ch. Stellar's Southern Cross, ROM. One of these, "Niblet" Ch.

Glentom Fancy Mint, ROM, was BOS at the 2005 National Specialty, tied for AKC top producing white Bull Terrier in 2008 and produced the 2009 #1 colored Bull Terrier, Ch. Glentom I Have No Commitment, ROM. One of the other sisters, "Meagan" BISS Ch. Glentom Mint Julep, ROM produced the 2010 & 2011 #1 colored Bull Terrier All Breed and 2011 Westminster KC breed winner "Maeve" GCh. Glentom's You Were Mint For Me, ROM.

All breeding bitches and dogs must be the appropriate age to go through extensive health testing before being considered for their program. Tom and Glenna have involved with bull terrier confirmation since 1987 and have accomplished many tremendous victories over the years! It was a very successful year for Glentom Bull Terriers in 2011. They bred the BTCA Silverwood Trophy Winner, the Westminster KC Best of Breed Winner, the Colored Bull Terrier in All Breed, the Eukanuba Best of Breed in Colored Dogs, the BTCA National Best of Winners, the Eukanuba Best Bred By in Colored and White Bull Terrier, the Eukanuba Award of Merit in Colored Bull Terriers, the Eukanuba Best of Opposite Sex in White Bull Terriers the Silverwood Puppy Sweeps the Best of Opposite

Sex. They were Awarded the AKC Gold & Silver Bred By Exhibitor Medallion and the AKC Breeder of Merit to top it all off! They have dedicated their lives to not only improving the breed but in 1998 Tom and Glenna were asked to co-chair the BTCA's Rescue Committee. They held that position from 1998 – 2003. She took over again in 2006 and is currently the chair of the newly formed 501c3 Rescue Welfare Trust Fund of the Bull Terrier Club of America.

"We continue to strive to breed top winning, healthy Bull Terriers who live long and happy lives in their homes. As mentors, we enjoy bringing new owners and eventual breeders into the fold. We believe that encouraging others to develop sound breeding practices will lead to success in the ring and help to educate the public on this wonderful breed."

## What Makes a Specialty So Special?

A Specialty Show is a dog show specific to one breed – there can be several specialty matches consisting of different breeds going on simultaneously – but the winners of each breed will not compete against each other. The most interesting part that makes Bull Terriers a little more special (and they are pretty special already :) is that they are one of the only breeds in the AKC which can show separately because of color. That means in an all breed show both a colored bull terrier and a white bull terrier can achieve a Best of Breed win to move onto the Terrier Group. It is only in a Specialty Show that the white bull terrier and colored bull terrier compete for Best of Variety. And to take it a step further – they are the only breed in the AKC that can be interbred and still be certifiable. Trying mixing a Pembroke and a Cardigan Welsh Corgi and you might start running into some trouble when you try to register the litter!

## Getting Ready for Spring

*Helpful tidbits to help you out with the changing of the seasons*

With each season come its pros and cons. While we love to get out in the show circuit or in the beautiful spring weather with our canine companions, before it gets too hot, there's one thing to remember: Protection! Fleas, Ticks and Mosquitoes are out there waiting for you and our pooch and can cause and transfer some pretty nasty sicknesses and diseases. Anemia, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever and Heartworm Disease are just to name a few– so stay ahead of the game and get your bully on their monthly preventions! There are several methods and products available for you to find what is right for you and your dogs! Be cautious: ask questions and read labels – not all medicinal products are safe for breeding dogs and/or bitches. Is your pup SAFELY protected?

## More Helpful Tidbits

### Canine Influenza

As the show circuits kick into full gear this spring – keep in mind the importance of good health practice! With dogs meeting other dogs from all corners of the country (and in some cases, the world) it is wise to be aware of what dangers could await you and your canine companions. Canine Influenza is a nasty little virus that can be spread with not only direct contact but through contact with inanimate materials (clothes, shoes, leashes, bowls etc) and with different dogs of all ages, it's a good idea to be prepared.

### What signs do I look for?

Fever, listlessness, coughing and snotty nose are some of the symptoms of which to be aware. This could lead to something as serious as pneumonia if not diagnosed or noticed immediately. In some very rare cases, even death has been reported. These symptoms are often treated with antibiotics and most patients do very well, but who wants a sick bully? They cost us enough money in “indestructible” dog toys and furniture! What does this mean if your pup was potentially exposed? Well, the incubation period for Canine Influenza is 2-5 days (day one is they came in contact with the infection and are symptomatic between 2-5 days) They are typically sick for 2-4 weeks and are typically contagious for about 14 days. Now, while every bully is special in their own way – it is always best to treat every symptom seriously and have your baby taken to vet if there are any concerns! Vaccinations are available; please consult with your regular Veterinarian if you have any questions or concerns!

## Bragging Rights

There's nothing like the thrill of watching the judge point to your baby out in the ring! Breeders and handlers work very diligently to achieve the Best in Show ribbon at every show. While that is a prestigious and honorable prize to win, let's not forget about the stepping stones along the way – there is much to be proud of from bullies of all ages and stages in their show careers! They have earned their rights to brag!


